Bayfield River Trails have something for every outdoor enthusiast

The Bayfield River Trail Association began in 2006 largely through the efforts of Bayfield residents Roger Lewington, Ray Letheren and Dave Gillians. Tens of thousands of volunteer hours have been invested in this project. Most of the Trail development volunteers are grandparents who go out in any weather with their own resources to ensure the rich woodland trails will be enjoyed by visitors today and for future generations.

Many area organizations have stepped up to the challenge of providing seed capital and dozens of volunteers and supporters came forward to help with developing the trails. The Association identified some unopened Municipal right of ways and once potential paths were identified, private property owners were asked to support the project by allowing part of the trail system to cross their land.

Hikers and walking groups from all over Southwestern Ontario are discovering Bayfield's 14 km of the four uniquely beautiful walking trails.
